Human geographies of climate change adaptation



Welcome


In 1863, a group of women from Bergen established the city's first ice skating club, continuing a tradition that is documented to extend as far back as the year 1619. In cold years, Bergensers could skate across the city centre, from Smålungeren to Puddefjorden. Historical records indicate that, in a handful of glacial winters, daredevils skated all the way to Askøy, an island located about 4 kilometres northwest of the city centre. Today, these accounts are met with reactions ranging from incredulity to nostalgia.

"What research project does this story inspire in you?" I asked this question to five colleagues who work on adaptation to climate change, though from rather different disciplinary perspectives. As expected, their responses were everything but alike. The answer I got from my human geographer colleague entailed work that is underrepresented in the scientific literature. For this reason, his response triggered two additional questions: what research projects would other human geographers imagine, based on the story above, and would those projects also suggest that the discipline is underrepresented in climate change adaptation research?

Replace the story above with 'adaptation to climate change', and you will have one of the main reasons for organising this conference. What does research on 'human geographies of adaptation to climate change' involve today? Where is the field coming from, and where is it headed? Are there under- or over-researched areas? I hope that, when we close the conference, we are one small step closer to having answers to these questions.
