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” THE ONGOING RECONFIGURATION of the global order is reshaping politics, societies, and everyday life across the world—and migration and asylum are no exception. Indeed, in recent years, we have witnessed significant transformations in the norms, policies, governance frameworks, and citizen attitudes that affect the lived experiences of migrants and refugees. Many of these changes point toward a striking convergence in a markedly restrictive direction. The restrictive convergence is further catalyzed by new, groundbreaking technologies like biometrics, robotics, and artificial intelligence. These processes affect not only migrants and refugees, but also their home societies and the transit and destination countries that receive them.


THIS SYMPOSIUM INVITES participants to explore how these broader shifts in the global order are unfolding in the field of migration. Bringing together comparative perspectives from Africa, the Americas, Europe, and Asia, we aim to map emerging patterns, identify regional variations, and discuss new theoretical and empirical insights. By fostering dialogue across disciplines and regions, the symposium seeks to open new conversations about how migration and refugee norms, regimes, policies, attitudes, and experiences are being reshaped in a changing global landscape.

Guiding questions for the individual panels

PANEL 1:

- **MIGRANTS, REGIONAL INTEGRATIONS, AND THE TRANSFORMATION OF BORDERING IN A CHANGING GLOBAL ORDER**
 - Where are the new borders in the new global order?
 - What are the new border policies and bordering practices, and their technologies (e.g., biometrics, global and regional databases and data sharing, artificial intelligence), in Africa, the Americas, and Europe?
 - How do the transnationalisation and supranationalisation tendencies on migration and asylum policies in the African Union and European Union, and the intergovernmental collaboration in the Americas, affect human mobility?
 - What about the lived experiences of migrants?

PANEL 2:

- **REFUGEES, MULTILEVEL GOVERNANCE, AND THE TRANSFORMATION OF PROTECTION IN A CHANGING GLOBAL ORDER**
 - Who are the refugees, asylum seekers, and other protection seekers in the new global order?
 - How is international law—including refugee law, human rights law, and emerging soft-law frameworks—being reinterpreted, stretched, or contested in the current global order.
 - Is there a conflation of the “migrant” and “refugee/asylum seeker” categories in the emerging global/regional norms and legal frameworks? (e.g., UN’s two Global Compacts on Migration and Refugees, the EUs New Pact on Migration and Asylum)
 - If so, how is this mirrored in the regional multilevel governance frameworks?
 - How do these transformations affect the international refugee regime?
 - What about the lived experiences of refugees and asylum seekers?

PANEL 3:

- **THE RIGHTS OF MIGRANTS, REFUGEES, AND ASYLUM SEEKERS; THEIR ACCESS TO JUSTICE; AND ATTITUDES TOWARDS THEM IN A CHANGING GLOBAL ORDER**
 - How is the reconfiguring world order affecting the rights of migrants, asylum seekers, and refugees and the members of receiving societies?
 - What role do local governments and frontline institutions play in shaping the recognition and access to rights, social protection and regular status for migrants and refugees? In what ways can their actions expand or constrain these possibilities (particularly as first responders in contexts of reception and protection)?
 - What challenges do migrants, refugees and asylum seekers face in accessing justice? How have these changed over time and in which direction? What examples of good practices can be identified in specific contexts, and what lessons can be drawn from them?
 - How may the new technologies (robotics, digital mass communication platforms, social media, and artificial intelligence) affect people’s attitudes towards human mobility, the international migration and refugee regimes, migrants, refugees, and asylum seekers?

Symposium format

The symposium “The Shifting Global Order and the Transformation of Refugee and Migration Regimes” brings together a group of experts in international migration with the aim of exploring how broader shifts in the global order are unfolding within this field today.

The symposium will be organised into three thematic panels addressing different dimensions of these transformations and their implications for the lived experiences of migrants, refugees and asylum seekers: (1) borders, regional integration and migration; (2) multilevel governance, international protection and asylum; and (3) access to rights and justice and attitudes towards people in contexts of human mobility.

Each panel will be structured around a shared set of guiding questions, which will serve as the starting point for a collective discussion.

The whole symposium is conceived as a roundtable, with all participants encouraged to contribute actively throughout all sessions. For practical and organizational reasons, participants have been grouped into thematic panels; however, everyone is expected, and invited, to engage across all three panels. For each panel, two participants have been invited to open the discussion with brief introductory remarks. Each panel will then unfold as an open discussion.

In order to facilitate exchange, all interventions should be concise and should not exceed 5-7 minutes. The aim is to encourage dialogue, identify emerging patterns and regional variations, and foster the articulation of comparative perspectives across regions, disciplines, and theoretical and methodological approaches. Contributions are expected to engage with one another, and participants are encouraged to revisit and further develop their ideas across the different panels.

To support participants’ preparation, the set of guiding questions are shared in advance (see previous page). In order to foster a dynamic, comparative, and interdisciplinary discussion of the issues under examination, the symposium prioritises a format of collective exchange over individual paper presentations. Interventions are expected to be delivered in English; however, we understand that some participants may feel more comfortable speaking in Spanish, and this will be fully accommodated.

The estimated duration of each panel will be 105 minutes.

Alejandro AGUDO SANCHIZ is Professor of Social Anthropology at Universidad Iberoamericana, Mexico City, and a member of Mexico's National System of Researchers. He holds a Ph.D. in Social Anthropology from the University of Manchester (UK) and has worked as a consultant for various Mexican NGOs and public institutions in the fields of social development, community safety and citizen security. He recently conducted a large project on humanitarian aid for refugees and asylum-seekers at the US-Mexico border. He is the author of "Modes of governance and the ethnography of activism at the Mexico-US border" (Dialectical Anthropology, 2023). 

Ann Cathrin CORRALES-ØVERLID is a social anthropologist who has conducted ethnographic fieldwork in Peru, the United States, Egypt and Norway. Her research centers on migrants' everyday experiences of borders, work, and welfare. She is a Postdoctoral Researcher in the Department of Social Anthropology at the University of Bergen, and an Associate Professor in the Department of Intercultural Studies at NLA University College, Norway. She serves on the boards of Nordic Migration Research and Norwegian Network of Migration Research. She is also an affiliate member of International Migration and Ethnic Relations Research Unit Bergen (IMER Bergen). Her work has been published in Ethnic and Racial Studies, Routledge, and DeGruyter Brill. 


Anne-Birgitte KRUM-HANSEN is currently Deputy Representative (a.i.) at UNCHR in Mexico. She has a Master's degree in Law, specializing in International Refugee Law, Human Rights, Humanitarian Law, and Conflict Resolution in UN Peacekeeping Operations. Throughout his career he has held several diplomatic positions, most notably as a mediator and Norwegian special envoy to Colombia. In 2017 he was appointed the UN Secretary-General's personal representative on the border controversy between Venezuela and Guyana.

Enrique CAMACHO BELTRAN is a Researcher at the Northwestern Research and Teaching Station of the Institute of Legal Research at UNAM (National Autonomous University of Mexico). He is co-coordinator of the institutional research line "Mexico: State, Nation, and Community." He is also co-coordinator of POLETH (Political, Legal, and Ethical Theories) papers incubator. He specializes in ethics applied to borders, migration, anti-discrimination, and anti-corruption. He is a Level I member of the National System of Researchers. He writes a monthly column in La Jornada Baja California called "El Escuchón" (The Eavesdropper). 


Gonzalo ITUARTE, O.P., has been a Dominican priest since 1970. He accompanied thousands of Guatemalan refugees in Chiapas between 1981 and 1998 and, in 1989, founded the Centro de Derechos Humanos Fray Bartolomé de las Casas at the initiative of Bishop Don Samuel Ruiz. He also founded Melel Xojobal, a civil association working with displaced Indigenous children in Chiapas. As Provincial Prior, he assumed responsibility for the Casa del Migrante in Ciudad Juárez. He participated in the establishment of the Servicio Pastoral a Migrantes "San Martín de Porres" and is currently Director of Centro de Derechos Humanos Fray Francisco de Vitoria. He holds an M.A. in Cultural Globalization and Christian Thought in Latin America.

Guillermo ESTRADA teaches public international law and international human rights law at UNAM. He is currently a researcher at Instituto de Investigaciones Jurídicas, UNAM. He has been a fellow at Edinburgh Law School; at University of Sydney; at Università degli Studi di Milano and the Max Planck Institute for Comparative Public Law and International Law. He has served as an arbitrator in the London Court of International Arbitration. He earned his law degree and PhD from UNAM, as well as an LL M from Universidad de Alcalá. He has published articles and texts on public international law, international judicial interpretation, and the inter-American human rights system. 

Hakan G. SICAKKAN (Dr. Polit.) is a professor of comparative politics, University of Bergen, Norway. He was a guest professor at the University of Copenhagen, University of Oxford, European University Institute, Sciences Po, and Humboldt University. He has conducted extensive research on the globalization of politics: formation of transnational political systems, democracies, public spheres, citizenship forms, cleavage systems, and policies, including migration and refugee policies. He has initiated and led large-scale international research projects on these themes, funded by the European Union: GLOCALMIG, EUROSHERE, EUROELITES, and PROTECT. He is currently working to establish a global center of excellence on political globalization and the transformation of migration and refugee regimes. 


Ietza BOJORQUEZ is a professor-researcher at the Department of Population Studies, El Colegio de la Frontera Norte, Mexico. She holds a Ph.D. in Epidemiology. Her research focuses on migrant health, mental health, health policies and health-related practices. She is a member of the Lancet Commission on Migration and Health-Latin America Node, and of the Lancet Commission on Health, Conflict and Forced Displacement. She co-leads the Border Humanitarian Health Initiative, an intervention to improve migrants' access to health care in border cities in Mexico. She leads the Certificate in Mental Health and Psychosocial Support, a joint program of the International Organization for Migration and El Colef. 

Iole FONTANA (PhD) is a tenure-track Assistant Professor of European Union Politics at the Department of Political and Social Sciences, University of Catania (Italy), and a 2024-25 Fulbright Schuman Scholar at the Center for Inter-American and Border Studies, University of Texas at El Paso (USA). She has done extensive research on migration governance, border politics, and asylum policies, with a particular focus on the EU–Mediterranean and US–Mexico borders. She has been a visiting researcher at the U.S. Department of State, the University of Delaware, the London School of Economics and Political Science, the University Hassan II in Morocco, CONICET in Argentina and the European Union Delegation in Tunisia.


Jose Mario SUAREZ-MARTINEZ is a doctoral candidate in Social Sciences at El Colegio de la Frontera Norte, a collaborator on the Humanizing Deportation/Asylum project, and a member of the State, Nation, and Community research group at ENID, IJ. His research areas are ethnic and racial inequalities and violence, and Black mobility between the Global South and the Global North, specifically in the Americas, Mexico, Colombia, and Brazil. Luciana GANDINI is a Senior Researcher at the Institute of Legal Studies at the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM) in the field of sociology of law. She is the Coordinator of the University Seminar on Internal Displacement, Migration, Exile and Repatriation (SUDIMER).

She holds a Ph.D. in Law from UNAM (Mexico) and an LL.M. with cum laude distinction from California Western School of Law (USA). As leader of the "Interdisciplinary Studies in Law & Public Policy" academic body, her research examines the Mexico-U.S. transborder legal environment. Her work focuses on economic regulation, transborder housing, and migration policy in the Tijuana-San Diego corridor. She has explored the legal implications of regional mobility, including transterritorial nationality and the socio-legal challenges of contemporary migration regimes.

Pierre G. VAN WOLLEGHEM is a political scientist with expertise on migration, asylum policy, and EU governance. His research bridges comparative politics, public policy, public opinion and methodology, with a focus on how states govern mobility, crisis, and diversity while upholding democratic accountability. He holds a Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Milan, Italy, and is currently Research Associate Professor at NORCE Research, Bergen, Norway. His work is featured in prominent academic outlets such as European Union Politics, International Migration Review, Journal of Ethnic and Migration Studies, and Journal of Common Market Studies. 

René ARGÜELLEZ holds a Master's degree in Public Affairs from Sciences Po Paris, with a concentration in Human Security, as well as a Bachelor's degree in International Relations from Tecnológico de Monterrey.
