2023 Activities

Introduction

In 2023, the NIA has delivered a satisfying array of academic activities in terms of both quantity and diversity. Our report on academic activities hosted at the Institute and the accompanying graphs relate the expansion of our reach to departments and (sub)disciplines previously underrepresented or entirely new to our institution. Noteworthy examples include the Social Anthropology Department at UiO and the Department of Biological and Medical Psychology at UiB.

The NIA's open lectures and other activities in 2023 were strategically crafted to maintain active engagement within pertinent academic communities, focusing on subjects central to our academic agenda, such as Archaeology, Classics, Social Sciences, and the Arts. Simultaneously, these initiatives aimed to broaden our audience and enhance our networking both locally and globally. This goal is substantiated by the growing attendance at our lectures, with a particularly noteworthy increase in online participation from Norway over the past year. Our expanding reach is further evidenced by the integration of our lectures into the UiB academic calendar, as well as heightened traffic to our website, as documented by UiB's Communication Division. Moreover, the introduction of new communication channels, such as the Newsletter and updated information leaflets, has unequivocally bolstered our outreach efforts.

Lastly, in 2023, significant efforts were dedicated to attracting and incentivizing teaching and research activities at the NIA, aligning with the objectives outlined in our updated action plan. Although there remains room for further advancement, we are pleased to note a renewed interest from various departments in coordinating courses at the NIA. Moreover, we have diligently pursued collaborative research endeavors with scholars and departments from Norway. 8. EEA grants funded Digital Humanities Project: Roadwiki

Responsible: Delia Tzortzaki Bilateral collaboration between Greece and Norway, EEA grant, 6000 EUROS from Bodossaki Foundation, Greece.

Info: The Roadwiki Project is a bilateral cooperation initiative within the framework of EEA financial mechanism 2014-2021, "Active Citizen Funds" - Greece: signed between the University of Oslo (agreement signed by Assoc. Professor Knut Ødegård; Department of Archaeology, Conservation and History) and Wikipedia School Association together with NIA and specialists in the domain of heritage research and documentation. The goal is to train the local community, including schools and cultural foundations, in archaeology and heritage preservation. Norwegian historian Dr. Thomas Husøy, who had previously received a stipend from NIA, undertook the task of compiling Wikipedia entries based on literary sources (mythological and historical accounts) about Tegea.

The primary objective for 2023 was a field trip to Tegea in order for the partners to study specific topics that would become entries registered into the Wikipedia material and immaterial heritage registry.. Phase one featured lectures at the Tegea Gymnasium and training of the Roadwiki participants in writing and uploading entries on Wikipedia (April 2023). Phase two, completed in late September, included a three-day field tour in Tegea/Tripolis focusing on field work in the region, visits to local libraries and museums as well as Wikipedia training sessions at the Tegea Gymnasium. The project was completed in late November 2023 and all deliverables were submitted to Bodossaki Foundation by the end of that month. The goals and results of the project will be presented at NIA in February 2024.




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
