Supervision of PhD-students


Unconventional career path – contributor to the growth of music therapy as a university discipline

Music therapy did not exist as a research discipline in Norway when I graduated as a music therapist in 1983, and my academic career path has therefore been linked to the development of this young discipline. When I defended my doctoral thesis at the University of Oslo in 2003, this was late in my career compared to a conventional path in a more established discipline, but it was the second doctoral thesis on music therapy submitted in Norway at that time. From when I graduated in 1983 and to this day I have been an active contributor in the process of establishing music therapy as a solid academic discipline in this country, within the context of international collaboration. Some examples follow. 1983-1986: Project worker in the first professional music therapy project in Western Norway. 1987-1988: Founder and first leader of the Sogn og Fjordane competency centre in music therapy. 1988: Founder and first leader of the first music therapy education in Western Norway. 1991: Initiator and chair of the first Nordic Conference of Music Therapy. 1992: Founder of Nordic Journal of Music Therapy. 2001: Founder of Voices: A World Forum for Music Therapy. 2003: Founder and leader of a new education course on music and health at Sogn og Fjordane University College. 2004: Founder and leader of the new masters education in music therapy at Sogn og Fjordane University College. 2004-2008: Project leader of the first music therapy research project with a grant from the Research Council of Norway. 2005-2006: Academic leader of the process that led to establishment of music therapy as a research-based discipline at the University of Bergen. 2006-present: Founding leader of GAMUT - The Grieg Academy Music Therapy Research Centre (University of Bergen & Uni Research Health). 2010-2012: Co-founder and first leader of Grieg Research School in Interdisciplinary Music Studies.

I define myself primarily as a theoretically oriented qualitative researcher, but I have also worked steadily to build quantitative and mixed-methods research in Norwegian music therapy. I invited Christian Gold from Vienna to join my research team in 2004, when he was a young candidate and the research group I have been leading received its first grant from the Research Council of Norway. Since then I have contributed to building an academic milieu (today the research centre GAMUT) that can support new research candidates. Christian Gold has developed to become one of the most prominent researchers in international music therapy, with specialized competencies in RCTs, complex interventions, and mental health.
